HMEA We continued working closely with HMEA and Family Continuity, two respected human service agencies offering services for people with a wide variety of challenges and their families. We look forward to merging on July 1, 2024—and helping more people get the support

Together, we will serve more than 45,000 individuals and families through ten behavioral health clinics, 148 group homes, six family support centers, ten day and employment programs, and dozens of community based programs.

These mergers will strengthen our mission, create more opportunities for employees, and provide new options for individuals and families.

#### **DIGITAL INCLUSION**



Thanks to a two-year grant from Massachusetts Broadband Institute, we hired a Digital Navigator to help people we support obtain digital devices, develop digital skills, and enroll in low-cost broadband programs. The Digital Navigator will help people learn to use telehealth, explore employment opportunities online, set appointment reminders using calendar apps, and stay connected with family and friends.

#### **HOPEWELL**



Last year, we began providing clinical support to 21 adults with developmental disabilities living at five group homes operated by sister agency, Hopewell.

At the end of the year, we assumed full-time care for the residents and overall management of the five homes.

We hired dozens of the staff working in these homes, so residents could maintain longstanding relationships with their staff.

#### MONGAN **INSTITUTE AT** MGH



During the pandemic, Advocates partnered with the Mongan Institute at Mass General Hospital, along with six other agencies, on a federal research project to study the best ways to mitigate the spread of COVID-19 and future infectious diseases in group living environments. More than 800 Advocates residents at 62 sites participated in the two-year study!

This was the first research of its kind. Previous studies focused on infectious disease in nursing homes or other shared living locations and did not include community living sites for those individuals with developmental disabilities or serious mental health conditions.

Nearly a dozen research papers are being written for publication in peer reviewed journals including Royal Society for Public Health and Disability and Health Journal.

#### **PATHWAYS TO INCLUSIVE HEALTHCARE**



We launched a new program in partnership with the Eunice Kennedy Shriver Center at UMass Chan Medical School to train recent college graduates planning to attend pre-medical, nursing, dental, or other healthcare graduate programs.

Students work directly with individuals with developmental disabilities at our day program and gain valuable hands-on training along with clinical guidance. At the end of the nine-month program, students receive a certificate in Disability Studies from UMass Chan Medical School.

Along the way, students develop skills needed to provide disability competent healthcare, which will make them better healthcare providers.

This group of adventurers spent the summer exploring Boston, from Museum of Fine Arts to a Harbor Cruise, from sailing on the Charles to cycling on the Minuteman Bike Trail. What's better than fun with friends? We opened our new **Community Behavioral** Health Center (CBHC) in February as part of the State's Roadmap to improve the delivery of behavioral health services. As one of 26 CBHCs across the state, we provide routine, crisis, and urgent substance use disorder and mental health services. We also provide care coordination, peer services, screening, and coordination with primary care providers. Through the CBHC, we will help more than 8,000 people this year from 31 communities. We are grateful to dozens of friends for their



commitment to helping people get the care they need—when they need it—including Congresswoman Katherine Clark; Governors Baker and Healey; EOHHS Secretaries Sudders and Walsh; leadership at MassHealth and Department of Mental Health; and Framingham Mayor Sisitsky.











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
